## WAR OF 1812 BICENTENNIAL PEACE GARDEN TRAIL

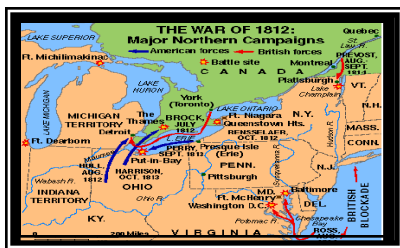
Peace Garden Route planned to commemorate the War of 1812 Bi-Centennial
